2. Calculate the area of the shaded region.

For draw a line from the origin to the point (4, 0) and draw a line from (4, 0) to (0, 3). The area is a right-angled triangle.

Calculate the total area of the shaded region to 2 decimal places.

3. Calculate the area of the triangle ABC.

Area = $\frac{1}{2} \times 4 \times 3 = 6$ cm^2

4. Calculate the area of the triangle CDE.

Area = $\frac{1}{2} \times 8 \times 3 = 12$ cm^2

Total Area = $6 + 12 = 18$ cm^2

Lizzie thinks she has made a profit of over 30% of the cost of the clocks.

Is Lizzie correct?

$$(2 \times £22) + £20 = £44 + £20 \\ = £64$$

$$£64 - £50 = £14$$

$$\frac{£14}{£50} \times 100 = 28\%$$



- 4 Usha is a local councillor.

She wants to write about a new housing development.

The diagram shows the space for the new development.



Usha thinks that the area of the development will be greater than the total area of 50 football pitches.

Usha knows

- a football pitch is rectangular 100m by 50m
- 1 mile = 1600m.

- (a) Will the area of the development be greater than the total area of 50 football pitches?

$$\frac{1}{2} \text{ mile} = 800 \text{ m.}$$

(5)

$$\begin{aligned} \frac{1}{2} \times 800 \text{ m} \times 800 \text{ m} &= \frac{1}{2} \times 640000 \text{ m}^2 \quad (\text{Area available}). \\ &= 320000 \text{ m}^2 \end{aligned}$$

$$50 \text{ m} \times 100 \text{ m} = 5000 \text{ m}^2 \quad (\text{football pitch}).$$

$$\frac{320000}{5000} = 64$$

Yes, it will be larger.

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

- (a) Convert 60 litres to gallons.







- 5 Nicola wants to put a flat roof on a bike store.

The roof will be

- made of concrete
- in the shape of a cuboid as shown.

$$\text{Density} = \frac{\text{mass}}{\text{volume}}$$



Nicola wants to put a metal strip along 2 of the longest edges of the roof.

She knows

- the density of concrete is 2300 kg per m^3
- the mass of 1 metre of metal strip is 5 kg.

Work out the total mass of the concrete and the strips she wants.

(5)

$$0.12\text{m} \times 2\text{m} \times 3.5\text{m} = 0.84\text{ m}^3$$

$$2300 \text{ kg/m}^3 \times 0.84\text{ m}^3 = 1932 \text{ kg} \quad (\text{concrete})$$

$$5 \text{ kg/m} \times 2 \times 3.5\text{m} = 35 \text{ kg} \quad (\text{metal strips})$$

Total mass :

$$1932 \text{ kg} + 35 \text{ kg} = 1967 \text{ kg}.$$

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1967 kg

- 6 Mai has this information about 100 flowering plants in her shop.

Size of flower	Stem length	
	Short	Long
Small	10	18
Large	43	29

She will take a plant at random from these plants.

- (a) Work out the probability that this plant will have a large flower and a long stem.

$$10 + 18 + 43 + 29 = 100$$

(2)

$$\frac{29}{100}$$

Mai will take at random a plant from the 72 plants that have a large flower.

- (b) Work out the probability that this plant will have a short stem.

(1)

$$43 + 29 = 72$$

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- 7 Sal works in a dress shop.
She wants to know how well the labels on the dress hangers agree with the true size of the dresses.

The table shows information about some hangers and dresses.

		True size of dress				
		10	12	14	16	18
Label on hanger	10	8	2	1	1	-
	12	-	9	3	1	2
	14	2	1	12	-	-
	16	1	-	1	13	2
	18	1	1	2	1	13
	Totals	12	13	19	16	17

Sal thinks that 2 in every 7 dresses are on hangers with the wrong label.

Is Sal correct?

Show clearly why you think this.

$$12 + 13 + 19 + 16 + 17 = 77.$$

$$2 + 1 + 1 + 3 + 1 + 2 + 2 + 1 + 1 + 1 + 2 + 1 + 1 + 2 + 1 \\ = 22.$$


$$\frac{22}{77} = \frac{2}{7}$$

- 8 James has a contract to paint 30 identical water tanks. He has to paint the outside surfaces of each tank, but not the top.

Each surface is rectangular.



James knows that 1 tin of paint

- is enough to cover 12 m^2 of surface
- costs £26.99

Work out the total cost of the tins of paint he will need for all 30 water tanks.

(6)

$$\begin{aligned} & (1.1 \times 0.8) + (2 \times 1.1 \times 0.6) + (2 \times 0.8 \times 0.6) \\ & = 3.16\text{ m}^2 \text{ per tank.} \end{aligned}$$

$$3.16\text{ m}^2 \times 30 = 94.8\text{ m}^2 \text{ (all tanks).}$$

$$\frac{94.8}{12} = 7.9 \text{ tins of paint} \rightarrow 8 \text{ tins needed.}$$

$$8 \times £26.99 = £215.92$$

$$\frac{30}{\left(\frac{1}{3}\right)} = 90$$



(a) For this information work out the median number of late trains in a day.

$$\frac{15+1}{2} = 8^{\text{th}} \text{ value.}$$

Lena says 'The median number of late trains in a day, from this information, is a good estimate of the average number of trains late over the period of time.'

(b) Is Lena correct?


Explain why you think this.

- 11 Joanna is a landscape gardener.
She has to fill a circular space with flowers.



The radius of the circular space is 4.5 metres.

Joanna will plant 40 flowers per square metre of space.

She will plant 4 times as many red flowers as white flowers.

How many red flowers will she plant?

(5)

$$\pi \times 4.5^2 = 63.617 \text{ m}^2.$$

$$63.617 \times 40 = 2544.69$$

$$2544.69 \times \frac{4}{4+1} = 2544.69 \times \frac{4}{5} = 2035.75$$

$$\Rightarrow 2036.$$

12 Jim owns a small business.

The table shows information about the weekly wage of the 40 workers.

Weekly wage (£)	Number of workers
320	10
370	13
420	8
470	7
520	2

Jim wants to increase the mean wage by 4%, plus £10

Jim thinks the new mean weekly wage of these workers will be more than £415

Is Jim correct?

You **must** show your working.

$$(\text{£320} \times 10) + (\text{£370} \times 13) + (\text{£420} \times 8) + (\text{£470} \times 7) + (\text{£520} \times 2)$$

(6)

$$= \text{£15700}$$

$$\frac{\text{£15700}}{40} = \text{£392.50}$$

$$(\text{£392.50} \times 1.04) + \text{£10} = \text{£418.20}$$

Yes, he is correct.


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
